




All BC bats are predators of insects including mosquitoes, agricultural and forestry pests. They provide Canadians with millions of dollars in natural pest control services.




Bats are neither rodents nor considered pests under BC law.





The Okanagan's Little Brown Myotis bat is listed as Endangered in Canada because of white-nose syndrome caused by a fungus.

This disease does not affect people or pets but has decimated bat populations in eastern Canada and USA.

BC bat biologists are on high alert for this disease!
